## Background

### **County Process**

- Updated County's COVID-19 Response and Recovery Plan.
- Established clear goals and objectives.
- Held 14 stakeholder meetings to help guide investments.
- Identified planning assumptions:
  - Adopt the maximum amount of federally-defined revenue loss calculation available to the County to provide the Board flexibility to address general government concerns
  - Ensure County-related programs/priorities are first to be funded by ARPA dollars
  - Establish criteria to evaluate internal and third-party funding requests
  - Align with recovery plan objectives and considerations
  - Align allocations with stakeholder feedback
  - All investments are within eligibility criteria defined by U.S. Treasury

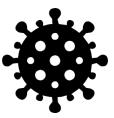

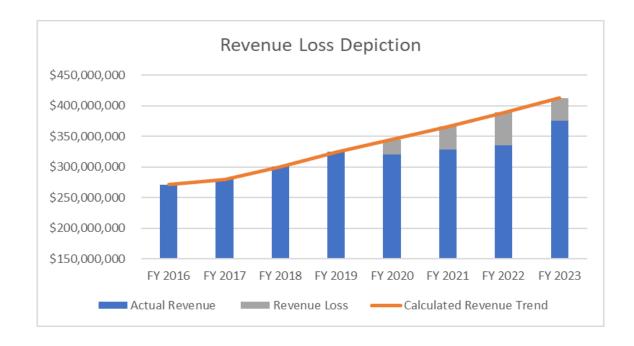
#### Revenue Loss Funds

- ARPA recipients can use funds on government services up to the calculated revenue loss amount.
- It is the most flexible eligible use category.
- Government services includes any service traditionally provided unless Treasury has stated otherwise.
- Specific prohibitions/restrictions on use:
  - Offset a reduction in net tax revenue enacted after March 3, 2021
  - Deposits into pension funds
  - Debt service or replenishing financial reserves
  - Settlements or judgments
  - Any use that conflicts or contravenes the purpose of ARPA



#### Revenue Loss Funds

- One goal of ARPA is to replace revenue lost during COVID-19.
- Treasury provided calculation for determining lost revenue.
  - Revenue trend three years prior to pandemic
  - Difference between estimate and actuals
- Revenue loss calculations:
  - FY20: \$24.8 million
  - FY21: \$37.4 million
  - FY22: \$53.4 million
  - FY23: \$36.9 million
  - TOTAL to Date: \$152.5 million

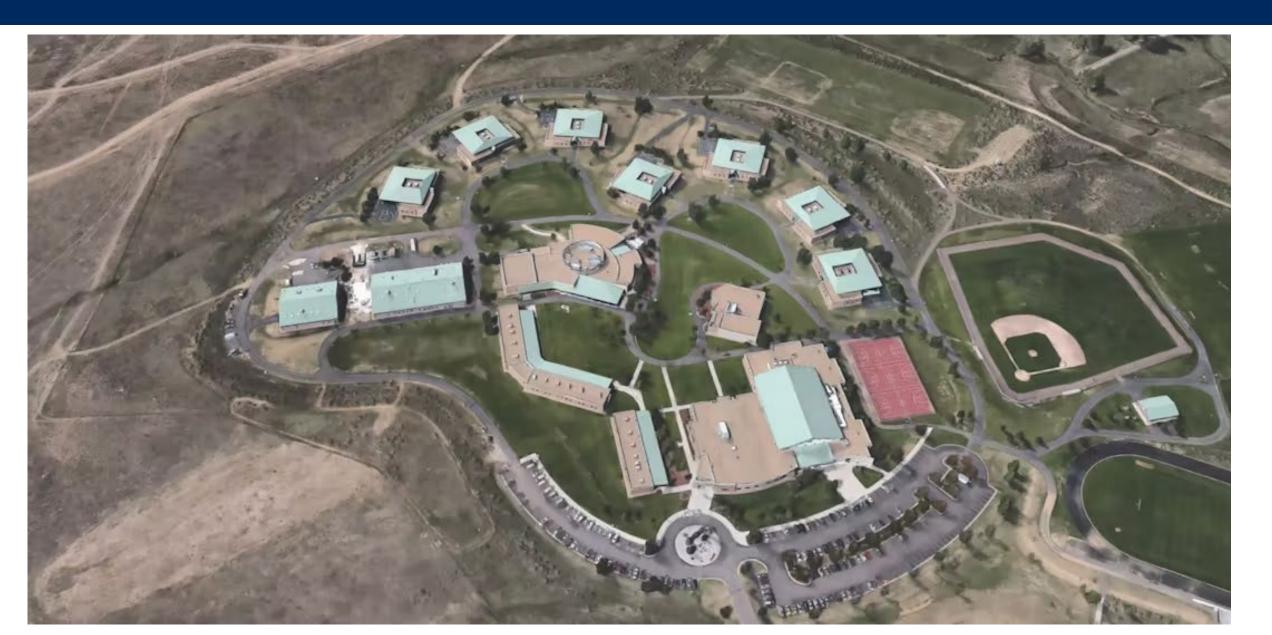
#### Reducing Homelessness

- A future without homelessness requires proven solutions.
- The State of Colorado is working to help individuals by creating Supportive Residential Communities. These communities will help people to overcome challenges, develop stability, and achieve goals.
- The Ridge View Campus in Watkins, Colorado was transferred from the Colorado Department of Human Services to the Department of Local Affairs (DOLA).

**Goal:** Convert to a Supportive Residential Community where residents can recover from homelessness, find long-term housing stability, and reintegrate into their community of choice.

#### Model

**Ridge View Supportive Residential Community** aims to provide the following services and programs:

- A transitional housing program with wraparound case management with a focus on recovery, care coordination, and employment and housing placement
- > A continuum of behavioral health services and substance use treatment
- A federally qualified health center or other primary care clinic

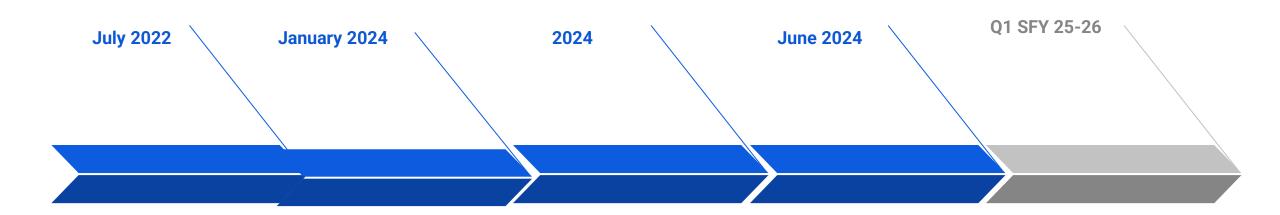

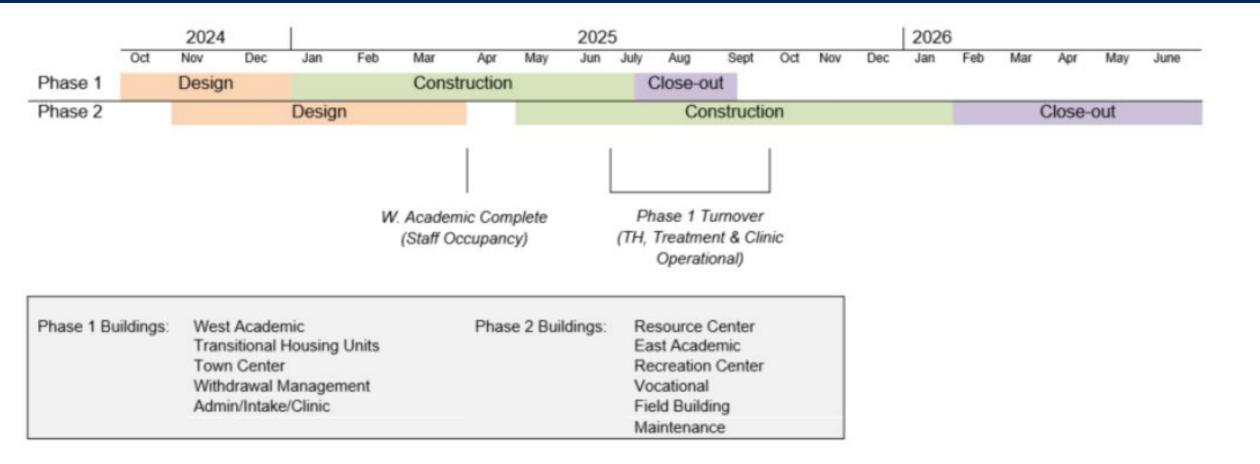

### Local Impact

- Property Access: Entrance road will be publicly accessible. Restricted access to campus.
- **Foot Traffic:** Two mile entrance and remote location foot traffic will be occasional/infrequent. Program is voluntary, not incarceration.
- Vehicle Traffic: Low to moderate traffic: mostly staff and contractors. Few guests will have vehicles.
- Transportation: Will provide transportation for general public and residents during stay for employment, medical, other necessary appointments to support recovery.
- **Emergency Responders:** Emergency responders to visit site somewhat regularly. Will discuss operating procedures with first responders (sirens).

#### Finance Accounting Support

- The Finance Department was allocated \$340,000 for accounting support to assist with complying with US Treasury documentation, reporting, and subrecipient monitoring requirements
- This funding will be exhausted by the end of 2024
- Quarterly reporting requirements for remaining projects will continue through 2025 and 2026 but it is expected most projects should be completed by year-end 2025
- Finance Department is requesting an additional \$120,000 in one-time revenue loss dollars to continue this accounting support through the end of 2025



### K-12 Updates

#### **Aurora Public Schools**

- SEL Framework project is fully spent and complete.
- Restorative Practices project has been abandoned due to changes in priority for Aurora Public Schools. \$320,000 deprogrammed back to County.
- \$10,000 deprogrammed back to County from the ESS project because the affective needs supply order did not cost as much as anticipated.
- Informing the Board that a total of \$330,000 has been deprogrammed back to the County. APS has affirmed their commitment to spending their remaining funds before December 31, 2024.

#### **Sheridan School District**

• Informing the Board that the Sheridan Health Services project is closed out and \$28,943 will be deprogrammed back to the County.

Total of \$358,943 moved to unallocated pool

## Water/Sewer Project Updates: Byers Water & Sanitation District (BWSD)

- County allocated approximately \$1.25 million in 2021 to help address failing water infrastructure system components part of a larger project that secured state grants.
  - BWSD conducted two procurements both over budget.
  - BWSD requested additional County funding to address this shortfall.
- Board agreed to increase allocation; agreement has been amended to increase allocation by \$240,000 (Total: \$1,497,000).
  - Comes from either unallocated or new deprogrammed funds.
- BWSD has committed to substantial completion of construction before end of 2026 and is grateful for Board's support of critical project.



#### Water/Sewer Project Updates: Inverness Water

- Informing the Board that the expenditure deadlines for both projects have been extended to April 15, 2025.
  - **Project #133 Cherry Creek Water Conveyance (\$213,200)** Inverness and Meridian committed to complete this project by Q1 2025, with payments expected per our agreement in Q1 2025.
  - Project #76 Local Connections (\$200,000) Completed design, procurement in process.
     Three-week construction process will start in Q1 2025.

## Water/Sewer Project Updates: ACWWA Proposed Alternative Funding Options

#### **Project No. 125 Peoria Lift Station Upgrades (\$500,000)**

- The project costs increased substantially due to the need for extended bypass pumping while certain tasks were completed at the main site. ACWWA had initially planned to divert flows to a neighboring utility, but ultimately ran into organizational and operational challenges that could not be overcome.
- ACWWA requesting reallocating \$500,000 from the Redundancy Pipeline project to put toward the Peoria Lift Station.
- This additional ARPA funding request would help offset the additional costs incurred on the project. This project provides certainty to the County in that 95% of the project is completed, and the remaining items are slated to be completed by the end of February 2025.

## Water/Sewer Project Updates: ACWWA Proposed Alternative Funding Options

Project No. 77 ACWWA-Cottonwood Joint Water Purification Plant Projects (\$800,000)

- ACWWA would like to propose that \$500,000 of the \$800,000 in ARPA funding go towards improvements at the Joint Water Purification Plant (JWPP) to address several projects to replace and upgrade aging infrastructure at the plant. The remaining \$300,000 would be deprogrammed back to the County.
- The are four other projects at the JWPP that are necessary to address aging infrastructure concerns and meet the eligibility criteria of the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund.

4. Replacement of Effluent Pump Station Piping =	\$60,000
3. Replacement of Rooftop Unit AC-1 =	\$90,000
2. Replacement of Finished Water Pumps 2 & 3 =	\$210,000
1. SCADA System Upgrade =	\$600,000

ARPA Funding Request (From existing allocation) = \$500,000



## End of Year Recommendations

#### ARPA Projects and Revenue Loss

- ARPA regulations requires all funds to be obligated by December 31, 2024, and fully expended by December 31, 2026.
- The team reviewed each remaining project and determined which should remain in the Grant Fund under the Treasury ARPA funding and which should be converted to Revenue Loss/General Government expenses before year-end.
- Recommending only the following projects remain under ARPA beyond end of 2024: \$8.25 million
  - State Ridgeview Campus: \$2.0 million
  - SAFER Transitional Housing: \$2.0 million
  - AuMHC Potomac Safety Net Campus: \$2.5 million
  - CCA STEM, Mechanics, Sustainable Energy Project: \$1.75 million



#### ARPA Projects and Revenue Loss

- All remaining funding for ARPA will be converted to revenue loss funds for use on general government projects. Estimated at around \$13.1 million before partial Q4 spending.
- Allocated ARPA projects with remaining funding (Human Services caseworkers, Community Resources Veteran Services Officers, K-12 Education grants, water and sewer projects, etc.)
   will continue through completion within a budget established in the General Fund –
   Administrative Services Department with funds rolled forward into 2025
- Any remaining unallocated funds will revert to General Fund balance
- Revenue loss supplementals will be included with Q3 Budget Review in November with adoption planned for the December 10th public hearing
- Spending for these revenue loss projects under ARPA will end on November 8th

## ARAPAHOE COUNTY

### Next Steps/Process/Timeline

- November 19, 2024: Q3 Budget Review will include reimbursement of revenue loss
- December 10, 2024: Q3 Supplementals including revenue loss considered at public hearing
- **December 31, 2024:** Deadline for obligating any ARPA funds
- January 2024: ARPA Update #12 (Project updates)
