The Office of Infectious Disease and HIV/AIDS Policy (OIDP) and the Office of Regional Health Operations (ORHO) are collaborating to implement this initiative. This initiative seeks to expand, plan, implement, and evaluate promising practices and develop novel approaches to increase vaccine confidence in local communities, particularly partnerships with organizations that work with populations with low vaccination rates. The PN program is a placed-based approach to significantly improve the academic and developmental outcomes of children and youth living in the most distressed communities of the United States, including ensuring school readiness, high school graduation, and access to a community-based continuum of high-quality services. The program serves neighborhoods with high concentrations of individuals with low incomes; multiple signs of distress, which may include high rates of poverty, childhood obesity, academic challenges, and juvenile delinquency, adjudication, or incarceration; and adverse childhood experiences; and also serves schools implementing comprehensive support and improvement activities or targeted support and improvement activities under section 1111(d) of the ESEA. All strategies in the continuum of solutions must be accessible to children with disabilities and English learners.

Promise Neighborhoods is particularly apt for addressing issues that worsened during the pandemic, such as chronic absenteeism and community violence, due to three key characteristics: (1) a strong backbone organization to support families, which can take years to build; (2) flexible funding targeted for year-round K-12 interventions; and (3) networks of partnerships that draw on the internal resources of the community, such as local organizers, trusted elders, and youth leaders, to guide services to those who need them most. PN allows grantees to use the first two years of funding for both implementation and planning activities. PNs also provide a unique opportunity for communities to create a comprehensive approach address neighborhood violence; coordination between mental health professionals, the criminal justice system, economic or workforce development organizations, and community leaders; engaging with Parks Departments, Departments of Justice, and local community organizations to focus on creating safe public spaces such as parks and more walkable communities, improving both safety and wellness in their neighborhoods, and creating a safe passage for students to get to school.

- Full Grant - A full (pro bono) grant provides creative/marketing services, to be performed by Causality, at no cost to the organization for the scope of services requested.
- Matching Grant - A matching grant is partial pro bono with a funding requirement of 50%. Essentially, the matching grant recipient receives their requested project at half the cost. The organization must be able to contribute or raise a sum equal to the value of the match to be provided by Causality. The organization may fund their match from their own funds or may seek funding from other sources. Many grant recipients have utilized the matching grant opportunity to secure outside funding—allowing them to receive the full scope of services at no cost to their organization.

If a grant is awarded the funds will be given to the OHV riding group/association for the specific and exclusive use for the project specified in the application.

The following are examples of appropriate projects for a Yamaha Outdoor Access Initiative grant:

- Trail development, restoration and/or maintenance (i.e. purchasing materials, hiring contractors, renting equipment, purchasing tools and safety gear).
- Trail signage (i.e., purchasing signs, equipment, installation tools, etc.).
- Stage area renovation/facilities (i.e., renting equipment, purchasing materials, hiring contractors, etc.).
- Protecting environmentally sensitive areas from illegal or inadvertent OHV use (fencing, bridges, hardscape, etc.).
