



Earmark Successes FY 2022-2024

In 2021, Congress reinstated the earmark process, which enables local governments and nonprofit organizations to receive direct federal appropriations for projects of various types, including capital construction, infrastructure investments, and research and programmatic support. The process is significantly different than the one that existed in 2011, with increased emphasis on transparency, accountability, and stewardship of taxpayer dollars; the new process also requires specific knowledge of appropriations accounts eligible to receive earmark funding. Building on our decades-long appropriations experience, Normandy has developed a robust, systematic, and effective earmarking operation that matches our client’s needs and expertise with our understanding of the process and relationships with key appropriators, staff, and rank and file lawmakers in both sides of the aisle. Below we have captured funding secured through the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022, FY 2023, and FY2024 processes. We currently have over 12 additional earmarks pending in the FY25 process that were selected by their respective members of Congress to move forward in the process.
