ARPA Overview

Program Background

- \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by Congress in March 2021.
- ARPA goals:
 - Support a strong public health response
 - Address negative economic impacts resulting from or exacerbated by the COVID-19 public health emergency
 - Replace public sector revenue loss
 - Address premium pay for essential workers
 - Invest in water, sewer and broadband infrastructure
- Built upon the CARES Act (March 2020) and Consolidated Appropriations Act (December 2020).



Program Background

- Arapahoe County received a total of \$127.4 million; approximately half was received in 2021, remaining in 2022.
- Funds must be spent on eligible items in alignment with program goals and U.S.
 Department of Treasury rules.
- Funds must be obligated no later than December 31, 2024, and expended no later than December 31, 2026.
- Treasury has quarterly and annual reporting requirements.



County Process

- Updated County's COVID-19 Response and Recovery Plan.
- Established clear goals and objectives.
- Held 14 stakeholder meetings to help guide investments.
- Identified planning assumptions:
 - Adopt the maximum amount of federally-defined revenue loss calculation available to the County to provide the Board flexibility to address general government concerns.
 - Ensure County-related programs/priorities are first to be funded by ARPA dollars.
 - Establish criteria to evaluate internal and third-party funding requests.
 - Align with recovery plan objectives and considerations.
 - Align allocations with stakeholder feedback.
 - All investments are within eligibility criteria defined by U.S. Treasury.

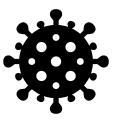

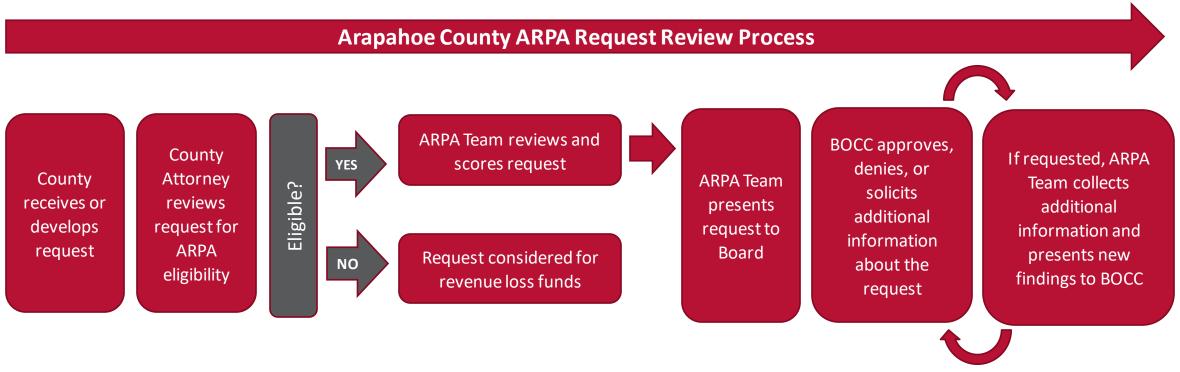

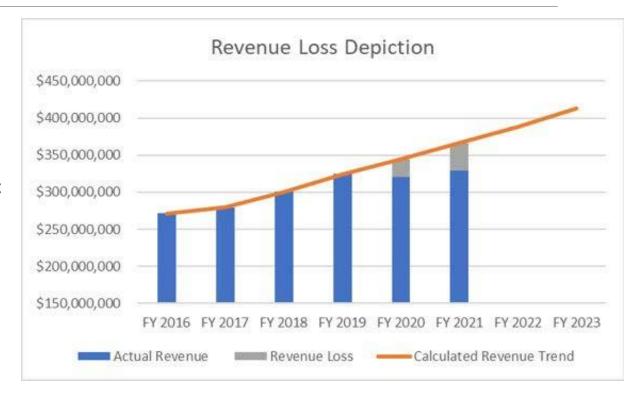
County Process

- Interdisciplinary team reviewed requests and made recommendations to the Board.
 - Commissioners' Office
 - Community Resources
 - County Attorney's Office
 - Finance
 - Human Services
 - Office of Emergency Management
 - Open Spaces

- Evaluation Criteria:
 - Alignment with Recovery Plan (40%)
 - Outcomes of the Funds (30%)
 - Capacity and Organizational Ability (10%)
 - Readiness/Timeliness (10%)
 - Financial Impact (10%)



- One goal of ARPA is to replace revenue lost during COVID-19.
- Treasury provided calculation for determining lost revenue.
 - Revenue trend three years prior to pandemic
 - Difference between estimate and actuals
- Revenue loss calculations:
 - FY20: \$24.8 million
 - FY21: \$37.4 million
 - FY22: TBD late spring





- ARPA recipients can use funds on government services up to the calculated revenue loss amount.
- It is the most flexible eligible use category.
- Government services includes any service traditionally provided unless Treasury has stated otherwise.
- Specific prohibitions/restrictions on use:
 - Offset a reduction in net tax revenue enacted after March 3, 2021
 - Deposits into pension funds
 - Debt service or replenishing financial reserves
 - Settlements or judgments
 - Any use that conflicts or contravenes the purpose of ARPA



Strategic Priorities

At a June 27, 2022, study session, the Board approved allocations for most of revenue loss funds for four strategic priorities.

\$42,700,000 (Total)

- \$40,400,000 (Strategic Priorities)
- = \$2,300,000 (Department Requests)



Department Requests

- Approximately 30% of requests were better suited for revenue loss funds.
 - \$15.6 million of requests with \$2.3 million of available funds.

• Process:

- County Attorney's Office reviewed each request for eligibility.
- Ineligible requests were set aside for revenue loss consideration.
- Commissioners' Office and Finance staff confirmed scope/budget for each request.
- Reviewed during Executive Budget Committee process.
- Approved projects were included in 2023 County budget.

Updated Requests

Additional/Updated Request

STRIDE Community Health Center

- Initial approval of \$1,590,000 allocation in December 2021 for dental services within Englewood.
 - Building on senior dental transition from Tri-County dissolution
 - Completed community assessment and market analysis
 - Leadership transition
- STRIDE transitioning to integrated whole person care approach for medically underserved
 - Ultimately will establish northeast Arapahoe County STRIDE campus (consolidating locations), providing teamcentered family practice, behavioral health, dental care, women's health, urgent care, pharmacy and care coordination/patient navigation services.
- Change how allocation used:
 - Construct 3 dental bays and lab in current Englewood location
 - Expand oral health services and mobile health street medicine team
 - \$1,389,000 personnel expenditures; \$57,000 capital and operational costs; \$144,000 administrative



Additional/Updated Request

Gateway Domestic Violence Services

- Initial allocation of \$1,500,000 in September 2022 for south shelter expansion.
 - Only agency that provides emergency shelter and supportive services to victims and dependents
 - Aging facilities in Englewood and Aurora; limited space
 - Turned away 700 individuals needing services in 2022
- During project development, Gateway has identified opportunity to consolidate facilities into a single campus, with a trauma-informed design, increased capacity and expanded services in Aurora (Arapahoe County).
 - Building 1: Non-congregate emergency shelter, with 12-16 bedrooms
 - Building 2: 15-18 transitional private rooms with space for case management, partner organizations, and counseling services
- Seeking state grants, other local funding sources; allocation leveraged for matching funds
